From the Rectory

Well, after the election it will be back to Parliament for everyone in September. One thing that will not have changed there will be all the shouting at each other during Prime Minister's Question Time. I do wonder what behaviour that models for children growing up; it is OK to shout at each other and never listen and understand other folks!?

If you have ever visited Wells Cathedral you may well have visited the large round room (50 feet/17 metres diameter) of the Chapter House attached to the Cathedral building. It is a vast echoing chamber with bench seats running all about its circumference. Here the Cathedral Chapter, at least 40 clerics from around the county would gather in days gone by to decide weighty matters. It is a place built for debate and decision just like the Houses of Parliament.

They, the Houses of Parliament, so the name suggests (Parliament, derived from 'to Parlen' [Middle English 1350-1400] to speak) are places in which to speak to one another. The chamber in the Commons however, unlike the Chapter House in Wells, is shaped to enable adversarial sides to face each other in verbal combat.

But the Chapter House in Wells is designed quite differently so folks can speak to one another and listen to what is being said. It is fascinating if you ever go there with a friend to sit opposite each other in one of the stone seats. If you speak, quite calmly you can be heard clear as day on the other side. However, should you stand forward a couple of paces and raise you voice your words find themselves echoed and disappeared into the high roof space, lost forever, never heard and frankly a waste of breath ever saying them in the first instance. I can't help but wonder if our society today needs some space in which we can listen and talk with each other in a calm manner, and with respect for difference of opinion.

Through listening I wonder too if we might find that difference; be it of opinion, colour, educational background, or outlook on life, is not something to be feared but celebrated! Rather than think differences cause our problems might it be that they bring gifts and skills that enable the big problems we face as a nation to be resolved – we need each other! Jesus sought to teach this to his followers when he described them as being like a body made of many parts. He emphasized that no one part was greater or loftier than another; eyes need hands and mouths need feet. More so the eye should celebrate the differences of the foot and appreciate them.

During the recent 80th anniversary of D-Day you could not fail to be reminded that it took the entire nation, the skills of every age and gender, working together to enable everything. I wonder what the children of today might achieve in the decades to come if what they saw modelled by adults about them was community that listens, respects differences, welcomes others abilities and skills?

We have assisted a 35% increase in the number of beneficiaries and households that we support. The key to this was our Cost-of-Living Grants programme.

It is not lost on us that in 1921, we provided bread and coal to help those struggling in the aftermath of the First World War, and in 2023, we provided fuel and food vouchers, following the effects of the current economic climate. The basic need for food and warmth does not change, but we continue to work to make sure that our delivery evolves to meet the demands of modern life.

We are proud to say our response was quick and effective. During 2023, we supported almost 27,000 people in need of help in the UK and 59 countries across the world and awarded more than £18 million in grants to individuals

Class 19-Victoria Sponge recipe

2x 8" sandwich tins: 8oz margarine, 4 eggs, 8oz self raising flour, 8oz caster sugar, red jam to fill, icing sugar to dust.

Preheat oven 180'c, Gas Mark 4. Cream sugar and margarine. Add eggs. Add flour. Divide batter between sandwich tins. Bake until done and skewer comes out clean. Cool on rack. Fill with jam and dust with icing sugar.

Class 08-Blackberry Tea Bread recipe

1x2lb loaf: 12oz plain flour,1 tsp mixed spice, 6oz margarine, 6oz caster sugar,8oz blackberries (fresh or frozen), rind and juice of 1 lemon, 1tbsp black treacle, 2 eggs, 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 1 tbsp milk.

Preheat oven 180'c, Gas Mark 4. Mix dried ingredients and rub in margarine. Dissolve B. soda in milk. Add remaining ingredients to batter. Add milk. Beat well. Bake 45 mins. Reduce oven 150'c, Gas mark 2. Bake for further 30-45 mins until skewer comes out clean. Leave in tin for 15mins before cooling on rack.


Visitor from America

Nearly 400 years after William Arnold left Ilchester for a new life in America descendant Tim Arnold returned to discover his roots.

Tim is the great-great-great-great-great-great-great grandson of William Arnold, a tailor, who was among the founding settlers of Rhode Island Colony, and of Providence, now the capital of the State of Rhode Island. William became one of the wealthiest people in Providence. He had good relations with the local Native Americans - the Narragansetts, wanting to deal justly with them, and pay for land. He, and his elder son, Benedict, learned the Narragansett language, and acted as interpreters. Later Benedict became Governor, of Rhode Island Colony. Among William's many descendants are former President George W Bush, and his father former President H W Bush.



Tim and his wife, Diane, were shown around the town by Gerry Masters - whose ancestors were living in Ilchester at the same time as William Arnold, and almost certainly knew him. The Arnolds learned much about the town's long history from Gerry, and from the Rev Bruce Faulkner who showed them the font in the parish church of St Mary Major where William Arnold would have been christened. The most poignant moment came when Bruce showed Tim and Diane the silver Communion chalice, which dates from 1573, 14 years before William Arnold was born.



Tim had been in email contact with Bruce and Gerry for some months before his visit, and particularly asked to be able to attend one of the regular Wednesday morning coffee morning in the Town Hall, famously convivial events which raise money for different charities. By coincidence when he and Diane visited on May 22 Ilchester History Group was hosting. During the even Bruce presented Tim with a specially bound book containing all Gerry's articles on local history, published over many years in the newsletter.

No-one knows why William decided, at the age of 48, to start a new life in a strange and potentially dangerous country. His father, Nicholas, who died some years before William sailed, was also a tailor. He ived in Northover. Nicholas and his wife, Alice Gully, moved across the river into Ilchester

before William was born. William sailed with his wife, Christian (born Christian Peak in Muchelney), sons Benedict and Stephen, daughters Elizabeth and Joanna, and nephews Francis and Thomas Hopkins from Yeovilton. Francis and Thomas's mother, Joanne, who was William's older sister, had married William Hopkins of Yeovilton but was dead by 1635, when the party left

Ilchester. Years later Benedict recorded: "my father and his family Sett Sayle from Dartmouth in Old England, the first of May, friday &c. Arrived in New England June 24 Ano 1635." And that was the last the Arnolds saw of the old country until a day in May 389 years later. Tim and Diane live in Auburn, in the foothills of California's Sierra Nevada mountains, a very different landscape from the Somerset Levels and Moors. As he gave Gerry's hand a heartfelt shake at the end of the visit Tim said with feeling: "We will always treasure the days and moments." TR

Back in the day

Ilchester's Part in the Monmouth or 'Pitchfork Rebellion'

The Monmouth Rebellion, also known as the Pitchfork Rebellion, or the West Country Rebellion, was an attempt to depose James II, who in February 1685 succeeded his brother Charles II as King of England, Scotland and Ireland.

A group of dissident Protestants led by James Scott, 1st Duke of Monmouth, the illegitimate son of Charles II, opposed James largely due to his Catholicism. Monmouth had fled to Holland after a previous attempt to assassinate Charles II had failed in 1683.

At the same time, grievances that were a combination of oppressive taxation, unfair land tenure, economic hardship and a lack of representation for the common folk, had been simmering for years and was exacerbated by practices of the ruling elite and poor harvests. Monmouth would have been aware of the general unrest and on 11th June 1685 he landed at Lyme Regis where he had widespread popular support, planning to take control of the area and march on London.

In the next few weeks, Monmouth's growing army of nonconformists, artisans and farm workers often armed with just pitchforks, fought a series of skirmishes with local militias and regular soldiers commanded by 2nd Earl of Feversham, and John Churchill. However, his recruits were unable to compete with the regular army and failed to capture the city of Bristol. The rebellion ended with his defeat at the Battle of Sedgemoor on 6 July 1685 by a royal army commanded

by Feversham and Churchill.



During the "Bloody Assizes" that followed the collapse of the Monmouth Rebellion, Jeffreys prosecuted the rebels with ferocity, executing perhaps 180 to 200 persons and ordering hundreds of others to be sold into slavery in the colonies. At the same time, he profited by extorting money from the victims.

It was long believed that our Town Hall was where Judge Jeffries held his assize and that he often stayed in the local hotel. Sadly, there is no proof that Judge Jeffreys ever came near Ilchester let alone presided over any court in the village.

Many years ago, I was asked to write a historical piece for the Western Gazette to help promote their advertising feature which was to be centred on Ilchester. The reporter covering the job was Torben Lee and he was fixated on the Monmouth Rebellion (Pitchfork Rebel-

lion) and its links with our gaol and the notorious 'hanging judge', Judge Jeffreys, a cold, cruel man who meted out the most horrendous punishments. Unfortunately, when the newspaper was produced Torben Lee had used what could be described as 'poetic license' and had written that 285 Ilchester people had been sentenced to death by Judge Jeffreys which of course is nonsense.

Here are the names of the poor unfortunates from Ilchester that did meet a sad end at the hands of the infamous 'Hanging Judge Jeffreys'.

Osmond Barret Edward Burford David Langwell John Masters
John Mortimer John Stevens Robert Townsend.

Of course, many more Ilchester and Somerset folk were 'Transported'.

Monmouth was beheaded for Treason at Tower Hill on 15th July 1685.

After the Glorious Revolution of 1688 Judge Jeffreys was incarcerated in the Tower of London where he died in 1689 of Toxaemia. Right up until the 1930's the mothers of West Somerset controlled their unruly offspring by threatening to send for 'Judge Jeffreys. **MP**

If you have a lump, it's important to be aware of any changes that may occur, so that you can keep your GP informed of your symptoms. Summer fruit, honey & hazelnut crumble

An Anglo-Saxon recipe taken from The British Museum Cookbook.

1kg/ 2.5lb mix of any summer fruits, eg blackberries, apples, elderberries,

Honey OR sugar, to taste

75g/3oz toasted hazelnuts

75g/3oz wholemeal OR wholewheat brown breadcrumbs

Heat the fruits with about an inch of water until soft, but not totally mushy. Add honey OR sugar to taste (Anglo-Saxons would have only had honey). Drain and save the excess liquid to serve with the finished pudding.

Chop the hazelnuts until they are almost as fine as the breadcrumbs, but not quite. Mix the dry ingredients together.

Spoon the fruit into an ovenproof dish. Cover with thick layer of the hazelnut and breadcrumb mix. Bake in a moderate oven (180'c, Gas Mark 4) for 20-30 mins or until the top is slightly crunchy and browned. Serve with cream or plain yoghurt and the warmed fruit juices.


