#### From the Rectory

Archaeology, so it is said 'is Rubbish'. In many ways that is true of course, visit any dig site and the folks working there will be seen searching out the broken bits and pieces thrown away or dropped by people from bygone ages. Archaeologists also love to find bones and foundations and even graffiti. And over the years our villages, with all the years of occupation have given much for folks to study and ponder about.

Some objects found are quite amazing, like the Roman mosaics in some Ilchester gardens. Some finds can be quite off putting like finding poo from hundreds of years ago. In each and every way these are the marks left by our forebears on the world in which they inhabited.

My job as a priest brings huge privileges, especially when it comes to taking baptisms and funerals. Baptism is of course an event filled with hope and anticipation of the life that will unfold for the precious little bundle presented to all.

A funeral is likewise a time of hope, hope in the resurrection life that comes through Jesus Christ for all who would take his offer to 'come follow me'. Funerals are also times that naturally look back over a life, with celebrations and sometimes regrets. Whichever it is I am always reminded that our span of years present us with the chance to leave a legacy, to make a mark on the world and the lives of those we encounter on the road of life.

There have been times when I have asked folks what they wished to say about their loved one they have struggled to think of anything out of the ordinary. Did they love those about them?, I ask. Did they look out for folks in need? Did they look after the village, help and support events? Well, yes they did this and that, comes the reply. Just the ordinary things, nothing special or amazing. In a age driven by celebrity and folks thinking they only amount to something if they do an amazing act it seems the 'ordinary' is not something to celebrate, or worse even think to do. However, it is the ordinary, the simple, the small that make the impact in any community.

It is these things that leave a lasting mark on the local community, on the world at large. This is precisely why Jesus calls all of us to 'love our neighbour as ourselves'!

# **Flu Vaccination Service**

We are a nonprofit charitable organisation that offers a fully equipped woodworking workshop and support to individuals and groups in a friendly, safe, supportive environment in order to undertake projects, learn new skills, and transfer skills they may have to others. The social element is of benefit to all as

is the camaraderie having a chat over a cuppa.

We undertake various community projects; recently repairing the barrel train planter on Pen Mill station with two new barrel carriages, constructing and delivering mud kitchen to a local pre-school. Also making 37 bird boxes for the Yeovil Community Rivers Trust, these are currently being installed around Sutton Bingham reservoir. Plus flat pack bird feeder stations for manor farm Lufton which the trainees assemble, it gives them such satisfaction and achievement value.

In order to showcase the work of our members and visitors we attend Sherborne Sunday market which is on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month April to December. In June, July and August we visit the street fayres and fetes of Hardington Mandeville, Marston Magna and Ilchester. The object of attending markets and events apart from raising funds to keep our workshop going is to spread the word about the National & local mensheds. The benefits that individuals gain in their general wellbeing and mental health through the team work on larger projects, passing on specialist knowledge and from working with the special needs trainees. One of the best things is, there is always time for a cuppa a biscuit and a chat.

# FOUND!!

Ilchester's long history means we never know what will turn up in the garden, or elsewhere, and we are delighted to report two discoveries.

Simon Jones found a 650-year old French "jetton" in the garden of his home in Priory Close. Jettons were a type of finely-minted coin-like metal counter, produced across Europe from the 13 th to 18 th centuries. They were used for calculations in bookkeeping, and as gaming counters. Laura Beckwith, Somerset's Finds Officer for the Portable Antiquities Scheme, has identified Simon's find as a 'Shield of





France ancient' type, dated

to the 1380s and produced under King Charles VI. Priory Close is not far from where quays existed on the river Yeo centuries ago, and also not far from where Whitehall nunnery stood.

A workman digging a trench in the road outside the Ilchester Arms has discovered a tiny Roman coin, identified by Laura as a "nummus" from the reign of the Emperor Constantine. Laura dated it to 330-335AD. Our picture shows the coin in the finder's hand.

Gentle Reminder

In 1976 Ilchester was given the historical category of Scheduled Monument. This is given to areas/ places which are of national importance. As a result significant parts of Ilchester have been given legal protection as an heritage asset. This is different to 'listed building' and there are different restrictions. For example **it is a criminal offence to metal detect** or to remove historical or archaeological items without Historic England's permission (and the land owner). The areas affected include Great Yard, Kingshams, The Sports field plus more. Check out the Historic England website and search for Ilchester. It's an interesting read.

## **Back in the day**

#### **Ilchester Mints.**

Coins were used in ancient times, not perhaps for purchase but more as a way of storing wealth in an age of barter and a way that the current ruler could demonstrate his supremacy. With the coming of the Romans the use of coinage became more widespread, including the use of bronze in casting or striking the coins as well as gold and silver. Alfred, king of the West Saxons (Wessex) set up the system of "Burgs", walled defendable towns, places it would be safe to set up mints. We now think of a mint as a building or place where coinage is minted, this was not necessarily so in the early times, it was usually where the **Moneyer** set up his workshop, not requiring any more space than a normal dwelling could provide, just a higher level of security for the dies issued by the King, and the silver needed, as all coinage was then silver. The term striking was quite literal as the obverse of the coin was inscribed on to the end of a metal bar called "the pile", which was spiked into a wooden block and the reverse die was on the end of a short bar, the "trussel". The silver blank was placed on the pile and the trussel was held in the hand or with tongs and struck a firm blow with a hammer. The Romans had made some coins by casting in moulds but the practice did not continue with the Saxons. Aethelstan, 925-940, Alfred's grandson, prescribed a law that a single coinage should be current throughout the kingdom but unfortunately the coins did not always carry a mint mark, therefore the place of minting cannot be ascertained with any certainty. We have to wait until the reign of Edgar, 959-975, before the use of a mint mark became universal and coins can definitely be attributed to llchester. At around this time there were eleven mints in Somerset, in the most important towns; having so many, helped speed the circulation of the coinage. It was also an advantage and privilege for a town to have a mint as it would draw extra trade to the markets and businesses of the town. The name of the town and the name of the moneyer appeared on each coin struck, this was in effect a guarantee of genuineness of the coin and enabled the king to check on his moneyers. It is possible that a moneyer may have struck coins in more than one town, as there are instances where an llchester moneyer, with an unusual name, appears on coins minted in a less important town. Mints of Somerset were;-Axbridge, Bath, Bruton, Cadbury, Crewkerne, Ilchester, Langport, Milborne Port, Petherton, Taunton and Watchet, with Ilchester seeming to be the most prolific by far. This is perhaps explained by the size and importance of the town, with Bath with 178 burgesses, Ilchester with 107 and Taunton the next



largest with 64. In fact the figures show that Ilchester was among the twenty five largest towns in early England. In the three hundred plus years from Aethelstan's accession and 1250 when the last llchester coins were minted there had been sixty six moneyers. All would have

been important men, burgesses, men of property and wealth, tradesmen or guild members, men of some standing in the community. Some may have been agents of even more nationally important people. Names of moneyers during the eleventh century do throw up some names of earls and bishops, such as Godwine, during Cnut's reign, 1016-1035, the family name of the premier Earls of Wessex and of Harold II, later to be defeated by William the Conqueror, Wulfsige and Leofric, Earls and bishop Leofwine. There is no firm evidence that these are the people whose names appear on the coins but it is a distinct possibility. There was a short period at the end of Aethelraed II's reign and the beginning of Cnut's, around 1010-1018, when the

Ilchester Moneyers operated at Cadbury. No doubt there was some local difficulties between the various factions or even the threat posed by Viking or Norse intrusions. It is during this period that many coins were handed over as "Danegeld", to be discovered hundreds



of years later in hoards, in the Scandinavian countries. From the period of Aethelstan 925, to the end of William II's reign the town name is given as contractions of Giflecester but with the accession of Henry I it changes to Ivelcestre and, or its contractions. This is not a large change if we remember that the Saxon G is pronounced like a Y, no doubt the name of the river also changed its spelling at this time, being known as the lvel until guite modern times. The silver penny, as the only coin in circulation, presented problems in trade and could legitimately be cut into parts as payment, to this end coins bore a cross on the obverse, perhaps only a very small cross in the centre, this was to guide the cutter when splitting the coin into halfpennies and guarter-pennies. By the reign of Henry I (1100-1135), the standard of coins manufactured and in circulation had fallen drastically and the public were losing faith in the coinage with many being hacked to check that they were not cheap plated copies. 1112 Henry decreed that all coins produced had to be split on their edges to show that they were in fact silver. This lead to even more problems and in 1124 at the "Winchester Assize of

the Moneyers" when all the moneyers in England were called in to account for their activities and some were mutilated, it is said they had their right hand and right testicle removed, as punishment for those who had misbehaved and a warning to those who had not. Elwine was Ilchester's moneyer at the time of this assize but we have no information on whether he was one of those suffering the mutilation. Through the reigns of Stephen and Henry II coins continued to be minted, but 1180 no coins are recorded from an Ilchester mint. By the reign of Henry III the quality of all the country's coinage was falling and in 1248 he decided on a reformation of English coinage. In October of that year he issued a warrant to the men and bailiffs of Ilchester to elect trustworthy officers for the mint. These officers were to assist in the reformation and were;-

Moneyers	lerveis Gris. Hugo Le Rus. Stephanus Le Rus. Radulfus Fardien.
Keepers of the dies	Robertus Fromund. Henricus Le Cam. Rocelin Barnud. Walterus Witbred.
Weighers	Rogerus Le Norais. Thurb Aurifaber.
Clerk	Walterus Loue.

The first remodelling introduced the "long" cross to the coinage to help reduce the clipping and the last coins minted at Ilchester were these. In 1250 when enough of these long cross coins had been produced Henry called in all the dies and centralized the production of the coinage of the realm to the royal mints of London, and Canterbury and the ecclesiastical mints of Durham and Bury St Edmunds. The two moneyers Hugo, and Stephanus
