

From the Rectory

The English do seem to be a hopeful people; certainly when it comes to the summer's weather. We are used the grey, and wet and cold of the winter, but there is always something about spring that gives hope of at least two hot and sunny days to come that we can call 'summer'. However, I suspect, as hopeful as you may be, you are not daft enough to go to the bookies and bet on it.

Knowing there will be summer but not knowing what exactly the weather will be means having a coat, a brolly, a jumper, shorts, t-shirt, sun cream and a flask of hot soup with you every day. And maybe the same could be said about our lives. Many people expend time and energy trying to second guess the future and worrying about having all that is needed to cope with it.

When the storm breaks having the right protection from the rain is a top priority. Having the ability to get out of the raging wind, being helped through it all by a friend and finding a safe haven and some warming tea is a key necessity. Being able to get out of wet clothes so we don't catch cold is a good idea. The last thing we think of during today's storms is what is coming next week; we just want to get through things now.

We often talk of the storms of life - the illness, heartache, job loss or bereavement we encounter. During these times we just want some sense of care and warmth, some relief from the torrents of emotion, some guidance to a better place – and rightly so.

The most known Psalm is number 23: 'The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.' It can be difficult in the dark times to see His presence; the trick to knowing He is there is, of course to get to know God in the good times; Christianity is not about 'insurance', it is 'assurance'!

Come to church - yes the hymns may be boring, the preacher may say something you do not like, the people may be very ordinary – but God on the other hand... Read a Gospel there are free copies of Mark's gospel in the churches you can take for yourself! Pray!

Heritage Centre aka The Museum



In the last issue we promised to tell you more about how the aunt of a world-famous author had to spend months living with the governor of Ilchester Gaol while awaiting her trial for alleged shoplifting. You may have guessed that the author was Jane Austen. Her aunt was Mrs Jane Leigh Perrot, who was arrested in Bath and accused of stealing lace from a shop. Mrs Leigh Perrot was married to Jane's mother's brother. The couple were wealthy, had no children, and were used

to leading a quiet life. Because of their wealth Mrs Leigh Perrot was not confined to a prison cell while awaiting her trial, but she did have to lodge with gaol governor, Edward Scadding and his wife - who had 10 children aged from 17 years to just a few months old. You can imagine how noisy the house was. Mrs Leigh Perrot wrote letters to the Austen family describing what it was like, with small children, dogs and cats filling the place - and Mr Scadding swearing, But she did appreciate that the family was doing its best to be welcoming.

Silhouettes were a popular form of portrait at the time, and the silhouette of Mrs Leigh Perrot here has been supplied to us by Jane Austen's House at Chawton, Hampshire, which is open to the public. This year is the 250th anniversary of Jane Austen's birth, and Ilchester Heritage Centre will have a small display about Leigh Perrot's stay in Ilchester - and the outcome of the trial. TR

Horse road safety

During the year of 2024 80 horse riders were injured, 58 horses were killed and 97 injured in road incidents. 3,118 road incidents involving horse were reported to the British Horse Society. 81% of these incidents were because the

driver was too close to the horse or driving too quickly. [www.bhs.org.uk/ support-us/our-campaigns/dead-slow/ accessed 16/3/2025].

The British Horse society has lobbied and collaborated with other road user groups and the Dept. of Transport. This resulted in an updating of the Highway Code in January 2022. The relevant section is below.

215 Horse riders and horse-drawn vehicles. Be particularly careful of horse riders and horse-drawn vehicles especially when approaching, overtaking, passing or moving away. Always pass wide and slowly. When you see a horse on a road, you should **slow down to a maximum of 10 mph**. Be patient, do not sound your horn or rev your engine. When safe to do so, pass wide and slow, **allowing at least 2 metres of space**. Horse riders are often children, so take extra care and remember riders may ride in double file when escorting a young or inexperienced horse or rider. Look out for horse riders' and horse drivers' signals and heed a request to slow down or stop. Take great care and treat all horses as a potential hazard; they can be unpredictable, despite the efforts of their rider/ driver. Remember there are three brains at work when you pass a horse; the rider's, the driver's and the horse's. Do not forget horses are flight animals and can move incredibly quickly if startled.

On the left, there is a picture of what one of the Roman rooms would look like. In the centre of the room, there is a mosaic of Diana the goddess of hunting. On the right there is a picture of where the Romans would host parties. I tried to play the Roman instruments. Next we went into the Roman courtyard. In the middle there was a Roman bath but we don't have any pictures. After we had finished in the villa we went into the museum. Inside, we made a bridge to represent Pons fabricus in Rome. Then I went to look at a screen where you had to use a brush to get rid of the soil and answer questions about the scull. Archaeologists knew the scull belonged to a woman because of the shape of her face. On the left there is a picture of us looking through some telescopes which shows battle scenes from the battle of Marathon. When we looked out the windows we saw the outlines of the Roman villa remains they found. To the left is a picture of the remains of the bath house they found.


Scouts

With guiding, girls have fun, adventure and the space to discover their potential.

This term Ilchester Rainbows and Brownies have been working on their "Be Well" theme award this is about looking after yourself and yourself, whether that be by being ready, steady and relaxing with our Rainbows Healthy Mind badge or being a food detective and becoming a chef with our Rainbows Fruit and Veg badge. In Brownies it is all about the Dancing badge, making up a new one and sharing their favourite one or sharing what they are grateful for with their Mindfulness badge.

Along with the girls looking at these badges independently we have been looking at the First Aid badges and completed our 1^{st} one. They have learnt about what they need in their own 1^{st} aid kits and what shouldn't be in there, mend a friend where we have fake cuts, we had to clean and pop a plaster on – safe to say this was the best activity they did and most of the Rainbows went home with a plaster with on tell her parent she had really hurt herself and managed to a treat! We covered about bites and what we should do, wash our hands correctly and about our feelings. We will be moving onto the next First Aid badge which they will learn all the recovery position and how to get help.

In between working on this topic some of our girls attended our district Thinking Day event with over 100 Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Rangers and Leaders. We visited 3 countries and 2 counties. We did different activities, made turtles in Brazil, stained glass windows in Gloucestershire, monkey masks in Ghana, did our own Glastonbury Festival plan in Somerset and Icey bracelets in Finland with Holly Webb who is a children's author and one of our region ambassadors. We also tasted apple juice from a local farm whilst with visited Somerset and while in Ghana we roasted bananas!

For Shrove Tuesday we made pancakes over tea lights by using a jam tart silver tray some took a little bit longer than others, but all girls made at least one and some brought a topping of their choice. With this activity they safely learnt how to light a match – it was a massive hit with them all!

We're very proud of them all for the hard work and dedication they've shown to achieve these awards; they've each overcome personal challenges to achieve these awards and have shown what resilient characters they are.

Going forward in the term, we'll be doing a joint event with 1st Fosseway Scouts (Martock), who are one of our partnered groups. For this, our Explorers will be running a portion of an evening for the scouts to achieve their YouShape award. Scouting is all about the youth and providing them with #SkillsForLife, and the YouShape award teaches young people vital leadership and organisational skills which they'll carry with them going forward.

We're looking forward to better weather and thinking ahead about all the outdoor activities we'll soon be doing, such as hiking, canoeing, orienteering, and wide-games.

We're always looking for help and support with our unit, whether that be in a behind-the-scenes role or as a Leader; there is always something for everyone, and it is a fantastic way to get involved in the local community, not to mention an incredibly rewarding endeavour.
