





From the Rectory

2025 brings significant anniversaries – it is, of course 80 years since the end of the fighting in WWII with VE and VJ day. It is 60 years since Applewood Smoked cheese was developed in Ilchester at the old cheese factory; and isn't it great to see the present factory with its new 'Ilchester Cheese' livery! For 85 years RNAS Yeovilton has filled the skies of the area with sights and sounds from war time Seafires, to Sea Vixens, Phantoms, Harriers, Wessex, Sea King, Lynx, Merlin and Wildcat helicopters (which reminds me of the large memorial plaque placed in Ilchester church to Roger Bacon, born and educated in the village in the 1200s, who 'dreamt of and drew designs for carriages in the sky').

I wonder if you have had, or will have, a significant anniversary this year; maybe a birthday, an anniversary for work, maybe moving to the area, having retired, entered a relationship — or finished one. Anniversaries can be happy events or sad! Understandably, we are drawn to the good times and memories and steer clear of those memories which are filled with pain.

When it comes to remembering important events songs and music often feature for us. A piece of music or a song will take us back to the time when For example, I wonder what tune reminds you of leaving school, the music industry talks of the soundtrack of our years.

In the bible the Psalms are a collection of songs for remembering. They are songs of celebration as well as deep pain and anguish; very personal but often at the same time of the community. Through the joy and the pain these songs of remembering provide an insight into human experience, which seems to change little over the centuries, they give space to engage with our own emotions and they help with reflection on our experiences; reflection that gives birth to hope for today and tomorrow.

This 'having hope' might seem strange when the experience had is painful, however it is possible to gain hope out of even the most despairing situation – I'm sure that's where the phrase 'every cloud has a silver lining' derives from. Often the silver lining comes in the shape of a friend or neighbour, a kind word or simple helping hand. These are the seeds of hope in any situation!

So I wonder, if you know someone who is struggling might you be a silver lining, offer a kind word or give a simple gesture of help to them, be a bringer of hope that tomorrow may see less pain and more joy.


If you have a joyous anniversary this summer may you have a great celebration and your heart be filled with song!



Travel Vaccinations Clinic

Why do I need travel vaccinations?

If you plan to travel outside of the UK, you may need to book travel vaccinations to protect you against some of the serious diseases that can be found in other parts of the world.

While the routine NHS immunisation schedule protects against a number of diseases, it does not cover some infectious diseases that are found overseas.

You could be at a higher risk of certain illnesses if your travel plans involve visiting rural areas, staying in hostel accommodation, camping or backpacking.

You are also at a higher risk of infection, or complications as a result of developing a travel-related illness, if you have a pre-existing health condition.

Which vaccinations do we offer?

Cholera

Hepatitis A

Hepatitis B

Japanese Encephalitis

Meningitis ACWY

Rabies

Tick borne encephalitis

Typhoid

Yellow fever

Certain countries require proof of vaccination before you enter or leave the country. This proof of vaccination should be documented on an International Certificate of Vaccination or Prophylaxis (ICVP).

You should book your travel vaccinations at least 6 to 8 weeks ahead of your travel date. This is because some vaccines need to be administered in advance in order for the body to develop immunity. Certain vaccines may involve multiple doses that are given over a period of weeks or months.





As June mentioned, Leonardos recently came in as part of their Be-A-Saint




the day, the team managed to repaint the entire exterior of the hut, fix three exterior shutters, repair a step that was a little wobbly, repaint the





Ladies' smock is a beautiful wild flower, but it likes damp places so is not so common as it used to be. Imagine my delight in April to see quite a few plants growing on the boundary bank of Yeovilton Airfield on the Bridgehampton road. There are also one or two in Limington churchyard -another reason for us not to cut grass if we don't have to until much later in the year. Its beautiful name reflects its delicate appearance and colour.

Its other name is cuckoo flower, because it flowers just when cuckoos are returning. The leaves of ladies'

smock are the favourite food plant of the caterpillars of orange tip butterflies. Only the male adults have orange tips to their wings. The male in this picture by Bob Eade courtesy of Butterfly Conservation is sipping the nectar of a ladies' smock flower. TR



Limington In Leaf

Limington in Leaf, our local biodiversity project covering all of the Yeovilton & District parish along with neighbouring villages, is beginning to work on plans for the 2025/26 planting season.



There have been a few uncomfortable events in Limington recently. We're really keen for this to be a project that the whole community can get behind.

Tree planting has iawnnumerable benefits. We're especially interested in reducing local flooding to keep our villages accessible in a rapidly destabilising climate, and planting trees is a fabulous way to do that. Trees also provide critical habitats, improve soil health, sequester carbon, reduce river pollution, and so much more.

We would love to know who in the parish would like to plant trees on their land, all the way from one tree in a private garden to multiple acres of woodland. Equally, if you're simply interested in helping to plant trees, we'd love to hear from you too!

We are typically able to provide trees for free through our work with fantastic charities or non-profit organizations such as the Woodland Trust and Reimagining the Levels. Once you're in touch, we can arrange to chat or visit your site and discuss your options!

Last year we planted around 250 trees in Limington and Draycott, taking our total close to 1,000. We are looking to build on this momentum over the next season and are exploring ways to expand our project to include other forms of enhancing biodiversity too. If you're looking to plant a wildflower meadow, for example, we may be able to provide free seeds or arrange for a group of volunteers to help prepare the site.

VICTORIA JAM SPONGE RECIPE (CLASS 72)

8 oz/225g margarine 4 large eggs

2 tsp baking powder 8 oz/225g self-raising flour

8 oz/225g caster sugar Red jam to fill

Icing sugar to dust top

Heat oven to 180C/Gas 4. Grease and line two 20cm sandwich tins. Cream butter and sugar then beat in the eggs. Then fold in flour and baking powder. Divide between tins and bake for 25 mins. Cool for 5 mins then turn onto cooling rack. When completely cool use jam to sandwich the cakes and then dust with icing sugar.

FRUIT CAKE RECIPE (CLASS 73)

200g soft butter or vegetable spread 200g caster sugar

4 eggs 200g plain flour

50g ground almonds 1 orange, zested and juiced

600g dried fruit 100g chopped pecans or almonds

100g candied peel, chopped

Soak dried fruit in orange juice and zest overnight. Heat oven to 170C/Gas 3½. Grease and line a 20cm tin. Beat butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, whisk in the eggs one at a time, then fold in ground almonds and flour. Add a pinch of salt and fold in soaked fruit, nuts and candied peel. Spoon into tin, level and then bake for 1 hour, then turn oven down to 150C/Gas 2 and bake for further 2 hours (or until firm on top and pulling away from edges of pan). Cool in tin.
