From the Rectory

August, the month with warmth and time to be still -

Well this is the hope so often. August is the holiday month, schools are out, the sea is warm enough, just to dip your toes into and you can usually guarantee your ice cream will melt if you don't hurry up and eat it.

In August we get to have time, the days are still long enough even after work to sit and take time. For me growing up, August gave the best of memories, hours out walking the dog, hours out riding my bike with friends thinking we were in a motocross event on the army ranges we lived next to. Time spent sitting watching cricket with family, a bag of crisps and a bottle of fizzy each. More time spent down the local river fishing with other friends or making dens and spears—who could throw the farthest? Whilst we did lots of things, we allowed time for doing these things, time to really make and fall out with friends, time to discover who we were and what the real world was all about—after catching the grasshopper, just how long can you hold in in your hand before it jumps?

The last Victoria Cross of WWII

Britain celebrated VE-Day amidst the relief of no more bombing raids and the prospect of thousands of soldiers coming home from Europe shortly. The feeling that the war ended in May 1945 still carries over to this day and overlooks the hundreds of thousands of British and Commonwealth men and women who were still engaged in a bitter struggle against a cruel and implacable enemy in the Far East. Phrases such as "Forgotten Army" and "Forgotten Fleet" were not used lightly when these forces returned home, often well into 1946. Some never made it through to go home.



In an attempt to bring Japan to the negotiating table without huge numbers of casualties on both sides, President Harry Truman authorised the use of the atomic bomb. The first was dropped on Hiroshima on August 6th. Not knowing that a second bomb was about to be dropped on that day, on the morning of 9 August 1945 two flights of Fleet Air Arm Corsairs from 1841 Naval Air Squadron on HMS Formidable, were programmed to attack targets on the mainland. The second flight (of 8 aircraft) took off about 0830 and about an hour later turned into attack Japanese shipping in a bay called Onagawa Wan on the east coast of the island of Honshu. The vessels put a up a desperate barrage of anti-aircraft fire and set the lead fighter on fire, but its pilot continued his attack run, hitting a destroyer with his bomb before the Corsair smashed into the sea and disappeared.

That action led to the last award of the Victoria Cross in the Second World War. The man who lost his life that day learned his trade at RNAS Yeovilton; he was Lt. Robert Hamilton Gray of the Royal Canadian Navy Volunteer Reserve.

"Hammy" Gray was born in British Columbia in 1917 and was at university when he enlisted in the RCNVR in Alberta in July 1940. His younger brother John had beaten him into the colours and was a WOP/AG in the Royal Canadian Air Force, flying in Hampden bombers over Gemany. During training in England Hammy decided to join the Fleet Air Arm and completed his basic flying training back in Kingston, Ontario. He was awarded his wings in September 1941, commissioned as a Sub Lieutenant and despatched to HMS Heron to become a fighter pilot. After learning to fly Sea Hurricanes he was posted to Nairobi, spending most of the next two years ashore in Africa but with a short detachment aboard the carrier HMS Illustrious.

Having been very lucky to build his flying experience with very little risk from the enemy, Gray was posted back to Yeovilton in February 1944 to learn to fly the powerful but difficult American fighter, the Chance Vought Corsair. The US Navy had rejected the aeroplane and was happy to let the US Marines

have it, but then the Brits gladly accepted it under Lend-Lease and showed the Yanks how to deck land it safely. Gray was posted to 1841 in August just in time for a batch of strikes against the German battleship *Tirpitz* anchored in Norway. Gray was very lucky to escape from one attack with a huge hole in his rudder but with an aircraft which was still flyable. He received two Mentions in Despatches for his part in these Tirpitz raids.

After a protracted journey to the Far East *Formidable* joined the British Pacific Fleet in Sydney, Australia in March and then embarked on a series of operations in support of the US Navy's island hopping campaign. As Senior Pilot Hammy Gray was heavily involved in the flying operations and was fortunate to be airborne when *Formidable* suffered a Kamikaze strike which caused substantial casualties on the ship. She withdrew to Australia for repairs and was back in the operational area by mid-July. Gray led several strikes over Japan and was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. He was on another one of these missions when he met his death, a mere six days before the Japanese agreed to a ceasefire.

The citation for his Victoria Cross was published in the London Gazette in November 1945, "for great valour in leading an attack on a Japanese destroyer in Onagawa Wan, on 9 August 1945. In the face of fire from shore batteries and a heavy concentration of fire from some five warships Lieutenant Gray pressed home his attack, flying very low in order to ensure success, and, although he was hit and his aircraft was in flames, he obtained at least one direct hit, sinking the destroyer. Lieutenant Gray has consistently shown a brilliant fighting spirit and most inspiring leadership."

The RAF consistently publishes that only one fighter pilot was awarded the VC in WW2, conveniently ignoring that a naval fighter pilot also received one, which is the last VC awarded to an airman. It is also the last one (of four) to naval airmen and also to a Canadian since then. Gray's courage so impressed his enemies that the Japanese erected a memorial to him on the shores of Onagawa Wan.

Remembering VJ day



On Friday 15th August the Royal British Legion in partnership with the Government will hold a midday National Commemorative Event to mark the 80th anniversary of VJ Day and the end of the Second World War.

The National Memorial Arboretum will be open to the public on 15th August, but some areas may be restricted. Whilst access to the National Commemorative Event is by ticket only, the general public will be able to see the event on screens.

VJ day - The last man to die

One of only 12 men recorded as having died on VJ Day, the last Allied serviceman to lose his life in WW2 was a Fleet Air Arm Seafire pilot, Freddie Hockley, who had completed his fighter training at RNAS Yeovilton in the summer of 1943.

Hockley was born at Littleport in Cambridgeshire in 1923, and joined the Royal Navy in 1942. He learned to fly at RAF Elmdon near Birmingham and then at King-



ston, Ontario, before final Fighter Training on Hawker Hurricanes at Yeovilton in the summer of 1943.

After a period flying Sea Hurricanes with 824 Squadron on convoy escort duties in HMS Striker, he converted to Supermarine Seafires and joined 887 Squadron, embarked in HMS Indefatigable, one of the aircraft carriers which formed the core of the British Pacific Fleet.

By the end of 1944 Indefatigable was in the Far East and flying operations against Japanese held targets. Hockley flew many sorties and in May 1945 shared in shooting down a Japanese Zero fighter. He was regarded as "brave, tough and uncompromising" and a competent pilot who was trusted with leading his unit's sorties.

In the early morning of August 15th, Indefatigable launched a strike of Fireflies and Avengers escorted by Seafires against an airfield on Tokyo Bay. Hockley was leading the escort even though his radio was not working. The formation was intercepted by Japanese Zeros and Hockley could not hear the warning call. His aircraft was damaged, and he bailed out.

Only one other Allied aircraft was lost during the operation (one of whose crew was killed) and when the rest landed back on their carrier around 0600 the signal "Cease hostilities with Japan" was being hoisted. Freddie Hockley was captured, interrogated and executed on the day that Japan surrendered. His murderers were later tried and convicted of war crimes.

Freddie Hockley's remains were recovered by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and reburied in the Yokohama War Cemetery.

Looking Ahead
















Lendiniae ESU



As always, the unit has had a busy few months. We've welcomed a new member to our leadership team. Jacob is a former Lendiniae Explorer who has come back into scouting as an adult. He was invested at the beginning of July and gave his scout promise whilst canoeing on the River Parrett in Langport before promptly being thrown in to celebrate.

We've done a lot of canoeing over the summer term, managing to squeeze in three sessions across June and July. Canoeing is a brilliant activity, but it always ends up with at least one boat capsizing (whether on accident or through sabotage is up for debate!) Being on the water is thoroughly enjoyed by both Explorers and Leaders alike, and we're very lucky to live in an area where this activity is so accessible.

Every summer, we set a goal to get outside as much as we possibly can because it's criminal to waste such beautiful weather. Out of 13 sessions, 9 have been spent away from the hut doing a myriad of different activities such as Canoeing, Hiking, Orienteering and Challenges. One popular challenge is our What3Words challenge, where explorers receive a question sheet with cryptic What3Words locations, sometimes they're scrambled, sometimes they're reversed, sometimes they're normal, but we pretend they're muddled. It's up to them to solve the puzzle and answer as many questions as they can in 90 minutes (with pictures to prove they've been to the location!) What3Words is a fantastic creation in which the world is divided into 3 metres by 3 metres squares. It's used by everyone from friends meeting up to the emergency services, and by doing activities like this challenge, it helps the Explorers to familiarise themselves with the app. In turn, this gives them confidence in their navigation ability and also the ability to stay safe when out and about.

Every edition of this newsletter, we're telling you about the awards achieved at Lendiniae, but truly, we couldn't be prouder of the hard work our Explorers put in. Back in early June, several of our Explorers took part in Cub Camp as members of the leadership team to help deliver activities to over 300 cubs. Alongside this, two Explorers also received some of the top awards in Explorers: The Platinum Award and The Diamond Award. The way we describe these is to imagine the Duke of Edinburgh's award plus a little bit extra. These two lads worked their socks off and were rewarded with one Platinum award and one Diamond award, respectively.

DofE expeditions are gearing up to go over the summer, and we're hoping by the next newsletter to be able to tell you all about it.


